







Learning Organiser: *How did the arrival of the Romans change Britain?*

Important historical vocabulary and terms I will learn during this enquiry

Natural resource	Something found in nature such as gold or water that people use to improve their lives.
Conquest	Gain control of a place and its people often by invasion.
Invasion	When an army enters a country to take control of it.
Occupied	Being controlled by people who have invaded and now live in and rule your country.
Emperor	The man or woman who is the supreme ruler of an empire.
Military	The armed forces of a country e.g. the army and navy (and in modern times the air force).
Slave	Someone who has been kidnapped and now the property of an owner they are forced to obey.
Border	The line or dividing point between one country and another.
Tribe	A large group of people who share the same language, customs and ways of life.
Uprising	Demonstrating against and often taking up arms against a controlling power.
Pacify	Calm down people who are part of uprisings and revolts against you.
Plebian	Someone belonging to the lowest, poorest and common people in Roman Britain.
Gladiator	A professional fighter in Ancient Rome.
Philosopher	Someone who spends their time studying and writing about the meaning of life.
Epitome	Something or someone that people see as a great example of the way they should live.
